Who We Serve

In 2025, Girl Scouts of Southern Nevada served more than 2,500 girls across the region, representing diverse racial, ethnic, and socioeconomic backgrounds. Approximately 60% of participants identify as girls of color, and 43% reside in Title I school zones or low-to moderate-income households. Programming is inclusive and open to all girls, without regard to religion, identity, ability, or background.

Retention Rate

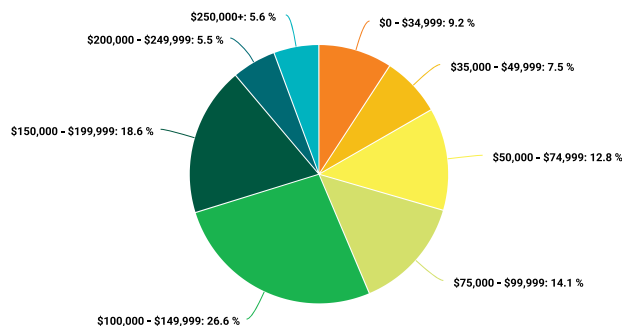
In 2025, we experienced a nearly 70% year-over-year average retention rate for girls and over 80% for our adults and volunteers. These numbers reflect more than participation, they reflect belonging. Members don't just try Girl Scouts. They stay.

They stay because it transforms their lives. And behind every one of those numbers... is a story. A girl who dared to try something new. A girl who led her first troop project. A girl who coded her first program. Climbed her first mountain. Pitched her first big idea. A girl who now believes that she can be absolutely anything.

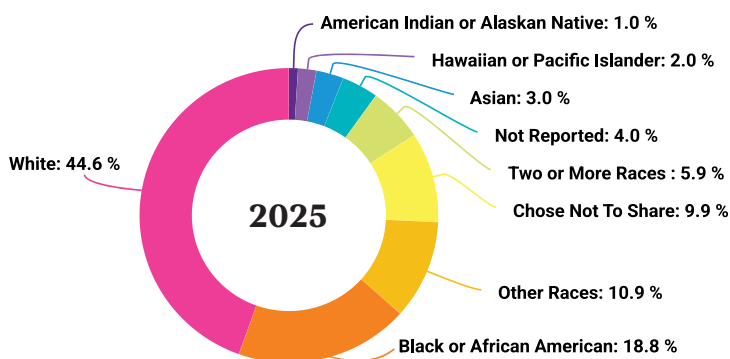

Adult/volunteer retention rate: **81.1%**

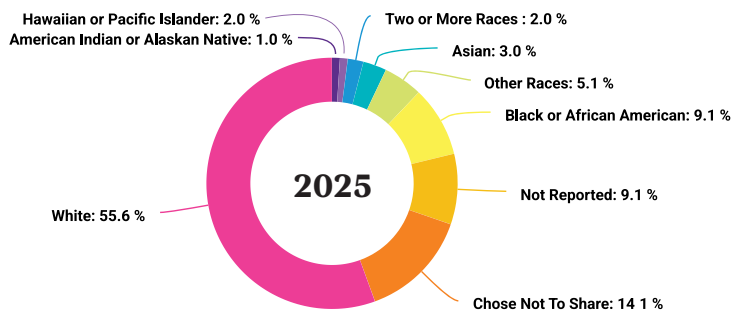
Income



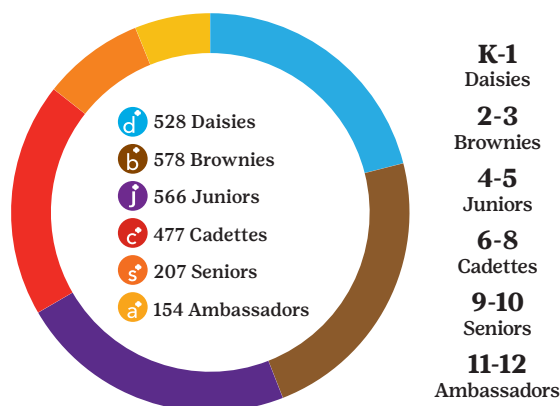
Girl Reported Race

Girl Scout Outreach

With Nevada ranked 47th in education and 45th in family and community support, access to high-quality out-of-school learning is critical. According to the 2025 KIDS Count Data Book, children thrive when they have strong relationships, stability, and access to resources—yet many families cannot afford extracurricular opportunities. More than 65% of Clark County students attend Title I schools, highlighting the need for affordable enrichment.

Girl Scout Outreach brings the proven Girl Scout Leadership Experience to under-resourced communities, offering structured, accessible programming through financial assistance and council support so every girl can participate.

Community Troops

Community Troops expand access to Girl Scouts for girls in Title I schools and communities with limited resources. Led by trained Girl Scout staff or supported volunteers known as Community Troop Specialists, these troops meet in schools, churches, and community centers.

Girls participate in hands-on, engaging experiences—earning badges, exploring STEAM, spending time outdoors, selling cookies, and giving back through service.

The rapid growth of this program reflects both community demand and the power of an experience where girls build friendships, skills, and confidence that last far beyond the troop year.

Tropa Exploradora Troops

Tropa Exploradora is an intentional effort to engage Spanish-speaking girls and families, making Girl Scouting more accessible and culturally relevant. By offering programming in girls' native language, we remove barriers and create welcoming spaces where girls can lead, explore, and grow with confidence.

Girl Scouts of Southern Nevada serves girls in kindergarten through 12th grade, providing a supportive, all-girl environment where they explore their strengths, take on new challenges, and grow into leaders no matter their background or circumstances. Guided by dedicated volunteers, staff, and a global network of alums, Girl Scouts equips girls with the skills they need to thrive in school, work, and life.

At the heart of our work is the Girl Scout Leadership Experience (GSLE)—a research-backed model grounded in

hands-on learning, outdoor exploration, and meaningful service. Through this approach, girls develop practical skills, learn to collaborate, embrace diversity, and create positive change in their communities.

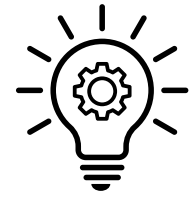
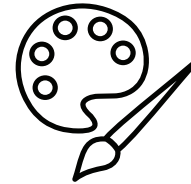
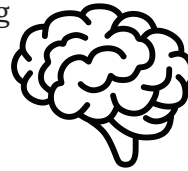
The Girl Scout Leadership Experience prepares girls to think critically, lead with compassion, and act with confidence. It builds the foundation for lifelong success by strengthening leadership, teamwork, responsibility, and civic engagement.

STEAM: Girl Scouts are Innovators

Girls explore science, technology, engineering, arts, and math through hands-on, curiosity-driven learning. As they grow older, Girl Scouts ensures girls step forward—building skills and confidence in spaces where they are often underrepresented.

Outcomes: Critical thinking, creativity, problem-solving

- 21 programs offered
- 92 badges earned
- 10 community partners



LIFE SKILLS: Girl Scouts are Leaders

Girl Scouts develop real-world skills through service, leadership training, and practical experiences. Girls strengthen communication, decision-making, and problem-solving—skills that prepare them to lead with integrity and confidence.

Outcomes: Leadership, communication, decision-making

- 42 programs offered
- 390 badges earned
- 17 community partners

Featured Badge: Senior Car Care

Driving is an exacting step toward independence, a chance to have fun going to new places, and a big responsibility.

Senior Girl Scouts took the wheel for an engaging, hands-on experience all about car care and confident driving! Participants learned essential maintenance tips, vehicle safety basics, and how to handle emergencies with confidence.

They also explored smart, eco-friendly driving practices—all while earning their Car Care Badge and gaining real-world skills that will last a lifetime.



OUTDOORS: Girl Scouts are Adventurers

From hiking and camping to environmental stewardship, girls build resilience and teamwork while connecting with the natural world. They learn not just how to care for the environment—but why it matters.

Outcomes: Independence, resilience, teamwork

- 57 programs offered
- 227 badges earned
- 19 community partners



ENTREPRENEURSHIP: Girl Scouts are Business Builders

Through Girl Scout product programs, girls run their own businesses—setting goals, managing budgets, marketing products, and practicing ethical decision-making. These experiences build financial literacy and economic confidence.

Outcomes: Goal setting, ethics, financial decision-making

Girl Scout Impact On Growth

Girl Scouts is where girls discover their power. Through hands-on experiences and real-world challenges, girls build confidence, strengthen their voices, and expand their sense of what's possible. These moments shape how they lead, learn, and show up in the world—today and in the future.

Backed by research and proven outcomes, the Girl Scout Leadership Experience helps girls develop skills that last a lifetime.

- **Strong sense of self:** Girls gain confidence by trying new things, learning from mistakes, and discovering their strengths—building a healthy identity that supports resilience and authenticity.
- **Positive values:** Girls practice integrity, responsibility, and empathy, developing an ethical foundation that guides their choices throughout life.
- **Challenge seeking:** In a supportive, all-girl environment, girls learn to take smart risks and view setbacks as opportunities to grow.
- **Healthy relationships:** Girls build communication and conflict-resolution skills that strengthen friendships, teamwork, and leadership.
- **Community problem solving:** Girls identify local issues and take action, learning that their ideas and contributions matter.

What Girl Scouts Teaches Girls



Girl Scouts gain skills that shape who they are and how they lead.

Girls learn to:

- Walk into new spaces knowing they belong
- Stay grounded through success and setbacks
- Collaborate, lead, and give back
- Respect diverse cultures and perspectives

- Belong to a sisterhood more than 100 years strong

Exploring Their World

Girl Scouts is not just about creating experiences in their community; it is also about creating adventures and opportunities to explore their world. Girl Scout trips build courage, confidence, and leadership by having girls plan, budget, and navigate new places, developing crucial life skills like teamwork, problem-solving, and time management while fostering cultural appreciation and lifelong friendships in a safe, structured environment. From local field trips to global adventures, travel fosters a strong sense of self, teaches girls to embrace challenges, and creates lasting memories as they progress from simple outings to complex journeys.

The Girl Scout Leadership Experience Lasts A Lifetime

The impact of Girl Scouts extends well beyond the program years. Research from the National Girl Scout Research Institute shows that Girl Scout alums are more likely to earn degrees, hold leadership roles, and engage in their communities.

Girl Scout alums:

- Are more likely to earn a four-year degree
- Are more satisfied in their careers
- Hold more management roles
- Are more engaged in civic and community leadership

In short: Girl Scouts builds leaders our communities and workplaces need.



Highest Awards And Scholarships

Highest Awards provide Girl Scout Juniors – Ambassadors with the opportunity to demonstrate their leadership skills while creating a lasting positive impact in their communities.

Bronze Award



9 Girls

Working as a team, fourth- and fifth-grade Girl Scouts earn the Bronze Award—the highest award for Girl Scout Juniors—by exploring and addressing a community issue that’s important to them. They’re leaders in the making!

Silver Award



19 Girls

Working as a team or individually, sixth- through eighth-grade Girl Scouts earn the Silver Award—the highest award for Girl Scout Cadettes—by identifying the root of a community issue they care about and then rolling up their sleeves and getting to work!

Gold Award



16 Girls

Gold Award Girl Scouts are the dreamers and doers who take “make the world a better place” to the next level. To earn the Gold Award, high school Girl Scouts research the root cause of a community issue they’re passionate about and lead a team to tackle it by planning and implementing a project that has tangible and lasting impact on their communities and beyond.

Night Sky Exploration in the Classroom



My Gold Award project addressed the lack of engaging astronomy education in special education classrooms. I created interactive activities for the students using my own design and manufacturing of the physical materials. I focused on commonly discussed constellations as well as the planets in our solar system. I shared the 3D files and digital designs so that other teachers can print and use these activities indefinitely.

Scholarships

In 2015, Girl Scouts of Southern Nevada awarded five girls **\$108,500** to support their secondary education.

Charles and Phyllis Frias Legacy Scholarship \$25,000 for 4 Years

This scholarship is awarded to girls with a GPA ranging between 2.0 and 3.6, and demonstrating financial need and is renewable for four years for a total of \$100,000.

Awarded to Keira N.

Helen Wronski Impact Scholarship \$1,000

This scholarship is open to current members of Girl Scouts of Southern Nevada in 9th, 10th, 11th or 12th grade who have earned their Silver or Gold Award by making a significant impact on our local community.

Awardee to Jeradin R.

Betty L Schults Scholarship \$1,000

This scholarship is open to current members of Girl Scouts of Southern Nevada in 11th and 12th grade who have already earned the Gold Award or will complete it by the time they graduate high school and is renewable for four years.

Awarded to Nevaeh R.

Cox Diversity Scholarship \$3,500

This scholarship celebrates one Girl Scout who has shown an outstanding dedication to inclusion, leadership, and creating positive change in her community.

Awarded to Amanda M.

GSUSA Gold Award Scholarship \$5,000

This scholarship recognizes one outstanding Gold Award Girl Scout in each council who has demonstrated extraordinary leadership that drives change in their community and beyond.

Awarded to Margaret C.

Camp Frias Frontier & Camp Ducktail

Girl Scout camp offers girls space to grow in ways that are hard to replicate anywhere else. At Camp Frias Frontier and Camp Ducktail, girls step outside daily routines, try unfamiliar activities, and build independence in a supportive, encouraging environment.

Camp experiences strengthen teamwork, problem-solving, and leadership through hands-on learning—while giving girls the freedom to explore, make decisions, and build lasting friendships. Whether attending a day program or an overnight session, girls leave camp with greater self-reliance, new skills, and a stronger sense of belonging.

From archery and horseback riding to hiking and creative arts, every activity is intentionally designed to support personal growth and discovery—helping girls return home more confident in what they can do and who they are becoming.

Not Just Horsing Around: Camp Frias Frontier

Camp Frias Frontier’s equine program combines outdoor exploration with responsibility and care. Through hands-on horse care and riding, girls practice focus, patience, and leadership while building trust—with themselves, their peers, and the animals they care for.

This unique experience encourages problem-solving, empathy, and teamwork while helping girls overcome fears, improve coordination, and form meaningful connections in a screen-free environment.

- **176** girls attended Camp Frias Frontier
- **30** girls received camperships
- **26** badges earned at camp

Camp Frias Frontier provides immersive overnight experiences that challenge girls while surrounding them with trusted mentors and peers. Through outdoor adventures and shared responsibility, girls learn resilience, cooperation, and leadership in real time.

Access remains a priority. The true cost of camp exceeds what many families can afford, and the council offsets a significant portion of expenses to ensure that financial barriers do not limit participation.

Camp Ducktail

Camp Ducktail offers an engaging day-camp experience for girls who are not yet ready for overnight stays. Campers enjoy a balance of outdoor play and indoor activities in a welcoming, age-appropriate setting.

The program introduces girls to new experiences while building friendships and confidence—often serving as a first step toward future overnight camp opportunities.

In 2025:

- **32** girls attended Camp Ducktail
- **4** girls from Community Troops participated
- **2** girls received camperships
- **8** badges earned

TEDRA

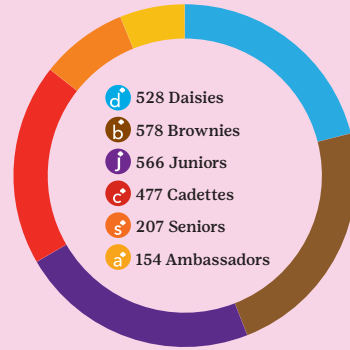

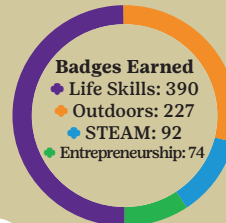
